All LCSD schools are assigned a Nurse, Health Assistant and School Counselor. Students who have 504's or IEP's will be supported by the people responsible for their individualized plans.

Building administrators will provide training to staff at the beginning of the school year and any time there is increased transmission. # Implementing mitigation activities, responding to periods of increased transmission, resuming baseline level mitigation, and debriefing actions to improve the process

Planning for and implementing proactive health and safety mitigation measures assists schools in reducing communicable disease transmission within the school environment for students, staff, and community members. Communicable disease, including norovirus, flu and COVID-19, will continue to circulate in our communities and our schools. Schools will utilize different mitigation measures based on local data, and observation of what is happening in their schools (e.g., transmission within their facilities and communities.) Hand Washing	SVS will ensure that students and staff have access to soap, water and alcohol-based hand sanitizer with 60-90% alcohol and will be encouraged and reminded to use these items during key times: before, during and after preparing food – Before and after eating. – Before and after caring for someone at home who is sick with COVID-19 symptoms, vomiting or diarrhea. – Before and after treating a cut/wound. – After using the toilet. – After changing diapers or cleaning up a child who has used the toilet. – After blowing your nose, coughing or sneezing. – After touching an animal, animal feed or animal waste After touching garbage. Nurse and/or health assistant will provide training to staff and students regarding proper handwashing and respiratory etiquette. Staff will reinforce procedures frequently within the classroom setting.
